"Is Las Vegas Boulevard still closed, do you think?" Danielle asked me as I came into the office the other day. "Did you hear about the shooting?" She was referring to the shooting and subsequent accident and fire that had claimed the lives of three people early that morning just off the Strip.

"No," I replied, shaken. And shaken more because I had just been verbally confronted myself by the driver of the car in front of me in a drive-thru lane. My encounter had ended quietly and with apologies - unlike what had happened hours earlier downtown.

"People are so angry," one of us said. And it wasn't a self-satisfied condemnation of other people — like "Oh, people these days!" It was a quiet, sad, anxious comment on the tone and atmosphere we've been experiencing in our city and in our nation lately. People feel anxious and uncertain, lashing out at each other, defensive and aggressive at the same time.

It's days like that one that remind me why our gathering in community — in religious community — is so crucial. For us and for the world. We who gather together, in covenant, committing to honor each others' path, to share in the work of building this community, to learn how to live together in wholeness and love instead of fear and distance.

This is what I hold in my heart as I think about making plans for the next years in our congregation's life. The possibility of what we can do, here within these walls and beyond them. The possibilities for learning and justice-building and worshiping and laughing and safety.

You will each be contacted in the next few weeks, by a member of our Stewardship Group. Yes, they will be asking you to make a financial commitment to the life and health of our congregation, but they will also be asking you about what makes this community important and transformative for you, what your hopes are for the future of our presence in our community. Please hear their questions, ponder them, and respond as you are able. Our collective commitment will be what helps us thrive and continue to grow our presence in the Las Vegas Valley.

Remember,

We share the sacred breath.

We gather together to build the beloved community, breath by breath, word by word, note by note, step by step.

We gather together to sing and speak and step and breathe the beloved community into being. This is our work. This is our calling. This is our joy.

March 50/50 Sundays:





UUCLV HUUMANIST FORUM Speakers & Schedules

If we look back in history, as it examines the evolution of religion, it's easy to note that as our knowledge base grows religions adjust by discarding some of their trappings from the "before we knew this" periods. I grew up eating fish on Friday - a practice long since dispensed. Major religions have fractionated, giving rise to numerous Christian denominations, numerous iterations of Judaism, Islam and even the Mormons have subsets ranging from the strictness of fundamentalism to liberal "want to fit in more to mainstream Christian LDSs". And this goes on and on. This getting mean and lean reconfiguration of the old institutions has its counterpart even with Humanists. Although they also are fractionated, Humanists have none the less seen the wisdom of redirecting their message; their service is to <u>not</u> confronting believers but promoting the goal of a better world for all.

Mike Sheffer will facilitate our March 3rd forum which invites us to acknowledge and appreciate the forces, the dynamics of religion which, when cleared of its dust and cobwebs, might surprise some of us confirmed free thinkers.

Crucial in this examination is the reality that religion holds great sway in the lives of millions - it cannot be casually dismissed - even by Humanists. But does religious practice possess what even Humanists could appreciate and perhaps learn from?

Future HUUmanist Forums, which are open to all members and friends of UUCLV as well as the general public, will be:

March 3rd: Mike Sheffer will facilitate this forum which will come from a TED talk entitled *Atheism 2.0*. This fascinating video is presented by philosopher-writer Alain de Botton. "Religion is far too subtle, complicated and intelligent that it is not fit to be abandoned for the religious alone. It's for all of us."

April 7th: Language, Power & Common Understanding: A Discussion: Bruce Isaacson will facilitate a discussion on the power of language either to obstruct or illuminate understanding. Surely, there is a better language to share understanding than today's dominant form seen in work and media. Is common understanding possible? Desirable? What is the meaning of 'in-group' language? Does technical language inform us or exclude us? What is the value of shared experience? What can we do to find a common language?

Sex Trafficking Bill Update

Nevadans for the Common Good organizer Robert Hoo reports that "Wednesday's hearing on AB 67 (February 20) was a very important step toward addressing the problem of child sex trafficking. Supporters packed the hearing rooms in Carson City and Las Vegas and the public show of support made a significant impact. There were about 100 people at the Grant Sawyer Building in Las Vegas and about 165 people in Carson City. The vast majority were supporters of the bill. Attorney General Catherine Cortez Masto was ecstatic about the support and very pleased about the outcome of the hearing. She is feeling hopeful about the bill's prospects.

Next Steps: The next step for AB 67 will be a Judiciary Committee work session that will be scheduled by Assemblyman Jason Frierson. The work session will focus on the details of the bill. This is where the bill's language may begin to be changed and amended."

Some UUCLV members and friends feel that there is a need for some changes in the bill to address civil liberties issues. More details later.



Art Show and Forums Ending



Our Social Justice Art Show, *Looking the Other Way*, is coming to an end March 2, about the time you read this article. It was a great success in educating people about what social justice is in general, and learning about regional history on issues related to social justice in Las Vegas: Black Civil Rights, Nuclear Weapons Testing, and Workers' Struggle for Fair Wages and Benefits. Plans are already being made for a social justice art show next year as well as forums throughout the year. Here's a report on the first forum.

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Civil Rights in Las Vegas: A Victory for the Rank and File



On Saturday, February 16, a panel discussion focused on one aspect of the battle for civil rights in Las Vegas. Panelists included former NAACP President (in Las Vegas) Eleanor Walker and Jarmilla McMillan, daughter of the first African-American dentist in Las Vegas. The panel was facilitated by Claytee White, director of the Oral History Research Center at the UNLV Library.

Thirty guests heard about the barriers broken down during the Black civil rights movement in Las Vegas. Although some major Black entertainers played an important role in forcing casinos to open its doors to African-American customers and job applicants, the rank and file of the civil rights movement ensured victory, in part through a consent decree with casinos.
