



"Change" Is a Word on Wheels by DeReau Farrar

Every Sunday morning, the church choir and I spend time in reflection and silence before we begin the first worship service. I often offer my thoughts on the day's theme or the state of the world, providing context to the message we bring.

On a recent Sunday, I said to the choir, "So often, we make the mistake of living according to our hopes instead of according to our realities." I didn't mean to say it, and I didn't know that I would. But as I did, the statement became immediately true.

I wonder if, in our efforts to "be the change we wish to see in the world," we stop short at our ideal selves: the idea of ourselves we are most comfortable with. I wonder how often I think *I've already been the change* — and I'm waiting idly for the tendencies of the world to catch up. I'm unsettled by how frequently I'm surprised by my own social idiocy. How many times need I screw up the same person's preferred pronouns, or note that I am not surprised that the person who just nearly ran me off the road is of a certain race and/or age, or make immediate assumptions about someone because of what I perceive to be their class?

Or maybe this is a better question: How many times do I need to make mistakes at the expense of other people, or people's groups, before I'm ready to admit that I'm not any better at this than the bigoted and willfully ignorant?

I am liberal. Often painfully so. I am not enlightened. I am not elevated. I am not better. But I believe, with everything I am, that I *can* be.

"Change" is a word on wheels. It's not a destination, but a journey. If I am to "be change," I must commit to humility and refuse to settle for my own comforting achievements.

UUCLV Board Meeting February 19, 2019

Meeting called to order by President Keith McMillen at 6:30. Rev. Rachel read the chalice lighting. Members present included Keith McMillen, Mary Jane Brustman, Lisa McAllister, Bruce Turner, Gail Knapp, Kathy Espin, and Shannon Porter. Rev. Rachel Baker was also in attendance. A quorum was present.

Accountability: Keith led the review of the list from last month, and members explained the things they had done from last list. Mary Jane said that the women's retreat is coming up, and it is going to be financially sound with 25 women coming. Rev. Rachel provided a list of her activities and their status. The covenant signature banner was done by Bruce. The nominating committee is looking for ideas for future board members.

Minutes from last month were approved and distributed. The approval committee for this month is Shannon, Mary Jane and Lisa.

REPORTS:

Rev. Rachel's report- Rev. Rachel reports that the congregation has two major projects underway. One is the Annual Pledge Campaign, which runs between February 24 and March 25. The second is the Focus Groups, asking who UUCLV envisions itself to be in the future, which runs during the same time frame. So far members and friends of the congregation have greatly enjoyed the group process. Since the New Year we have seen an increase in attendance up to between 75 and 95 people present. UUCLV is currently running the Senior OWL program, coordinated by Athena Anderson, Faith development Educator. This year we are running three adult faith development formation series. Building Your Own Theologies, Resistance and Transformation, and Me and White Supremacy. Rev. Rachel will be participating in a UNLV class, Strong Financial Oversight and a Collegial Learning Group looking at best practices of faith development for children and youth in congregations in the current social and political environment.

Treasurer's Report- We need to increase our income to meet our expenses. January was very much below expectations, and so far February is not looking better. Kathy moved that we transfer the money from line item 2.500.135 Sunday coffee hour into 2.500.001 growth and renovation fund. The board believes that this \$900/+ account was left over from when it was a restricted account. Motion adopted unanimously.

Three Square- We need to find a pest control contract and are currently taking bids. With Jim Brustman's help we have a contract with Three Square, and he has earned his food handler card. He is willing to help anyone else who wishes to do this. It can be done online. We will need to have someone with that card whenever we distribute food. We have the second Saturday in April as our first day.

Vice President's Report- VP Bruce reported that we have vertical blinds, visitor chairs, two-drawer locking file, and rack for robes have been bought and installed in minister's office. We are still looking for windows for the study and office. We have some issues with the zoning on the property if we wish to sell it. These issues also apply to improvements in the façade. His report is attached to these minutes.

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Standing and Special Committees- Lisa is doing a social justice overhaul. She is updating our Internet presence that has some things that are seriously out of date.

Focus Groups- There will be a meeting of the congregation to discuss the result of these discussions. It has been moved to April 14 instead of the current date in March, since it is an opportunity for the board to present what it has learned. Then the board and the minister will discuss what the priorities for the next actions should be.

Our Realistic Aspirational budget- It will be based on the actual pledges received. The drive starts next week. The board worked on creating the framework as a goal.

NEW BUSINESS

Insurance- Motion to increase our insurance to \$142 additional annually for the building, This will keep us on track to be able to replace the building at code if needed.

Gratitude Sunday- The board discussed some ideas.

Accountabilities- Rev will check calendar for gratitude service, minister's report uploaded on Thursday. Lisa- get her food handler card, make calendar change for congregational meeting, and prepare crafts idea for April 28. Kathy will have budget reports done before the next meeting, and will find out about dropbox default; move money into building usage instead of rental. Bruce will send focus group notes to Rev Rachel; closet bar up for Rev. Rachel, check the cost of millwork for windows in doors; check with Colleen Hall-Pattern about availability of husband, Mark, for a fundraiser; and complete VP reports. Gail will prepare and distribute minutes. Keith will sweet talk Adela (Gail's sister) into providing a future fund raising talk. Mary Jane will finish earning her food handler card, work on the fifth Sunday fundraiser; and complete work on the women's retreat. Shannon will approve minutes, work on advertisement with Erma for the Center (the LBGTQ center); get quote for pest control; and earn a food handler card.

Meeting adjourned at 9:10 p.m.

Spokane

The Spokane region is the gateway for adventure and exploration in the Intermountain Northwest. Located driving distance from Glacier National Park and Yellowstone, Spokane is nestled in natural beauty.

Spokane is located on interstate I-90, 110 miles from the Canadian border and 18 miles from Idaho. It is the largest city between Seattle and Minneapolis.

Spokane International Airport (GEG) is serviced by Alaska, American, Delta, Frontier, Southwest, and United Airlines. Nonstop service is offered to 17 destinations, including Minneapolis, Chicago, Dallas, Phoenix, and LAX.

Spokane is accessible by rail via Amtrak's Empire Builder route (Chicago - St. Paul/Minneapolis - Spokane - Portland/Seattle). It is also reachable by Greyhound Bus.

Excellent Programming

GA will offer more than 100 programming selections over the course of five days. This year, in addition to Theme-Based Programming, the schedule will feature Role-Based Track Programming, including time for discussion among attendees, sharing inspiring models and stories, and concrete suggestions for how to further the work or "take it home." Many Voices Meeting

Themes: School & Acceptance

"School days, school days, good old golden rule days..." The school experiences of attending storytellers were not all "good." Initiating the evening, the story leader told of being a doctor's daughter and therefore singled out as a probable leader or worthy associate. Her desire was to be left alone unencumbered by baggage from her father's community position. As a result, the storyteller skipped school but still excelled in classes. After filling her days with poetry and creative writing, all courses were passed. Not allowed to graduate because of low attendance, her diploma was received by taking the GED exam. With some similarity another speaker's father was loved and respected in the community. Doing poorly in her classes for no apparent reason, the teller was considered mentally challenged. After muddling her way through elementary and high school, this low achiever surprised everyone by entering and finishing college. Much later in adult life, it was discovered that this female's learning and work were hampered by Attention Deficit Disorder (ADD). With this knowledge, she progressed with much improved self-esteem. A male participant, who loved poetry and art, added his tale of school antipathy. Like the story leader, he was truant until mentors astutely allowed him to participate in writing, art and other creative classes where he excelled.

For one person, school days were in England at a school for girls. There everyone wore the same uniform daily. Although expectations for her success were not high, elementary, high school and premedical classes were completed. After marrying and moving to the United States, she entered and finished courses at a medical school in the Midwest under less than perfect circumstances. After many years, to her chagrin, a letter was received from the medical school congratulating her long-past graduation and soliciting funds for the school.

Teaching was the focus of a few comments. One person expressed excitement about a program for high school students with serious deficits in reading. Instead of demeaning the youth by assigning them children's books at their level of expertise, students were programmed to read books to much younger elementary school children. Another told enlightening stories about teaching in the Peace Corp, working in extremely impoverished surroundings. Although hours were long and the processes rudimentary, the experience was rewarding. A male contributor was complimentary to a teacher encountered in college. The philosophy teacher spoke of beliefs conflicting with those of the student. An assigned paper offered opportunity to challenge the teacher. Expecting to receive a low grade, the teller was surprised upon receiving an "A". This, he said was "the measure of a good teacher" who rewarded the "thinking process" rather than his counter viewpoint. Another positive response combining "school" with "acceptance" was that of a person recruited for an acting class populated with much younger students. The class allowed students to learn about directing, acting and staging by participating in all three. After being accepted by his classmates, the narrator was selected as the play's older main character. He wondered if this may have been the reason for his initial recruitment, which didn't matter because the experience was extremely rewarding. Finally one speaker revealed that at a music school, seeking instructions for playing basic guitar chords, she met and married the teacher. It seems fitting to end with the old classic:

School days, school days
Dear old golden rule days
Reading and writing and 'rithmetic

Taught to the tune of the hickory stick
You were my queen in calico
I was your bashful barefoot beau

Taught to the tune of the hickory stick And you wrote on my slate, "I love

you, Joe"

When we were a couple of kids



On New Year's morning, 1975, Archie Jones sits in his car on a London road and waits for the exhaust fumes to fill his Cavalier Musketeer station wagon. Archie--working-class, ordinary, a failed marriage under his belt--is calling it quits, the deciding factor being the flip of a 20-pence coin. When the owner of a nearby halal butcher shop (annoyed that Archie's car is blocking his delivery area) comes out and bangs on the window, he gives Archie another chance at life and sets in motion this richly imagined, uproariously funny novel.



Epic and intimate, hilarious and poignant, *White Teeth* is the story of two North London families--one headed by Archie, the other by Archie's best friend, a Muslim Bengali named Samad Iqbal. Pals since they served together in World War II, Archie and Samad are a decidedly unlikely pair. Plodding Archie is typical in every way until he marries Clara, a beautiful, toothless Jamaican woman half his age, and the couple have a daughter named Irie (the Jamaican word for "no problem"). Samad--devoutly Muslim, hopelessly "foreign"--weds the feisty and always suspicious Alsana in a prearranged union. They have twin sons named Millat and Magid, one a pot-smoking punk-cum-militant Muslim and the other an insufferable science nerd. The riotous and tortured histories of the Joneses and the Iqbals are fundamentally intertwined, capturing an empire's worth of cultural identity, history, and hope.

Zadie Smith's dazzling first novel plays out its bounding, vibrant course in a Jamaican hair salon in North London, an Indian restaurant in Leicester Square, an Irish poolroom turned immigrant café, a liberal public school, a sleek science institute. A winning debut in every respect, *White Teeth* marks the arrival of a wondrously talented writer who takes on the big themes--faith, race, gender, history, and culture--and triumphs
