### Introduction to the theme of the month by Rev. Rob Hardies:

### Hope

The reason people come to church... is to look for hope....The Rev. David Eaton once wrote: "The church is that institution whose primary purpose is to help people... maintain hope in their lives. When people have no hope, they discover hope together. When they can't discover hope, they create hope together." People come to church... looking for a little hope....

Andrew Delbanco has something to say about hope. Delbanco is a professor at Columbia and one of the best expositors of the Unitarian tradition in America. He wrote a book... called *The Real American Dream: A Meditation on Hope*. In that book he says what we all know is true, that from time to time in our lives we get the feeling that all of the random experiences and sensations and events that we call our lives, don't really add up to anything. That they're just meaningless. We always live at the brink of this chasm of meaninglessness, where with just a nudge, we might tumble into melancholy and despair. "Why am I here?" "What has my life meant?" "What's the purpose of it all?" "Hope," says Delbanco, "is the stories we tell that help us make meaning out of our lives." The stories that restore to us our sense of purpose and worth and make our life worth living again....

I know... that this is what religion is about most fundamentally: it's about people telling stories of hope. Telling them and hearing them. No biblical scholarship, no new-fangled theology, no archaeological discovery will ever change what is at once the most primitive and yet the most profound tradition in religion: people telling stories of hope. From the cave dwellers to us, it's no different: people sitting around a fire—or a flaming chalice—telling stories of hope....

The church is that institution whose primary purpose is to help people maintain hope in their lives. When people have no hope, they discover hope together. When they can't discover hope, they create hope together.

### **UUCLV Board Minutes March 19, 2019**

Meeting called to order by President Keith McMillen at 6:30 p.m. at the church. A quorum was present with members Keith McMillen, Gail Knapp, Kathy Espin, Bruce Turner, Lisa McAllister, Mary Jane Brustman, and Rev. Rachel Baker..

The chalice lighting was led by Rev. Rachel.

Accountability-The following items were completed during the past month: Rev Rachel reported that the gratitude service has been moved to May 4; Lisa is studying for the food handling card, and is working on craft project for our meeting on April 28; Kathy said that budget reports have been provided in Drop Box; and accounts are changed; Bruce has updated Rev. Rachel on focus groups; and was going to check with Mark Hall-Patten about a time he might be available and willing to do a fundraiser. He is looking for a date in October near Nevada day; Keith did not find an opportunity to talk to Adela Oppenheim about the possibility of a fundraising talk on Egypt; Mary Jane has not yet gotten her food card, but she has worked on the Sunday lunch fundraiser on the 31 of March which is the fifth Sunday. Pest control has been hired and has completed the first service. Gail has completed minutes.

**Minutes-** approved minutes were distributed. Gail will add the minister's report that has been sent to her by e-mail. New minutes approval committee for this month will be Rev. Rachel, Bruce, and Mary Jane.

#### **REPORTS:**

**Rev. Rachel Report-** Rev. Rachel Baker reported new energy and enthusiasm with the focus group discussions, the food pantry project, and the recent ways to serve the congregation survey. The Annual Pledge Campaign launched in February. Pledges are lower than they have been in recent years. Rev. Rachel suggested that the Board think about doing a second ask. A Path to Community series of two classes has been scheduled. Rev. Rachel has begun a four-week Strong Financial Oversight class through the UNLV Continuing Education program and has joined a Collegial Learning Group on Faith Formation and the Future of Sunday School.

**Finance**- Kathy has provided a written report that is attached to these minutes. Last month the income was greater than expenses. So far this month is also looking good. She will be posting the audit report in Drop Box.

**Facilities-** Jim Brustman is going to arrange to have the floors stripped and waxed. Stu is in the hospital and unable to work on this. The shop door is not working properly.

**Vice President**- Bruce explained that he is trying to find an electrical fixture for the sign. He has identified two florescent lights, but he has been looking for LED options. He has had some success. He has purchased a rack for robes and stoles for Rev. Rachel's office. But he was unable to install them this past month.

**Board Liaison Report:** Mary Jane reported that the Women's Retreat was a great success for building community and ended up financially sound. In addition, Keith and Mary Jane reported that we are now officially a Three-Square partner. We will be doing what they call a farmer's market. Food will be delivered on pallets to be distributed that day. We will have produce and nonperishables. We will be on the website at Three Square, and there will be handouts at local schools. There will be a banner sign or sandwich board to put out when it is time saying something like "food pantry today." Our first distribution will be April 20 in the morning.

#### **NEW BUSINESS:**

**Black Lives Matter Banner-** There is a consensus that we should eventually put it outside, but there are some concerns and issues that need to be resolved before this is presented to the whole congregation. Issues included the need to discuss a plan for what happens if or when it is vandalized, and how it is displayed. Gail agreed to check with Congregation Members about the opinions of SURJ members about our display of the banner outside of the church.

**Next Congregational Meeting-** This will be the announcement of the results of the focus groups on April 14. We will also be looking at the budget two weeks before the actual budget vote. There will also be a conversation about whether to offer Rev. Rachel an additional two years on her contract.

Future Board Planning: We need to start planning for gratitude Sunday on May 5.

**Delegates for GA and DA-** we need to know how many delegates we are entitled to have. District Assembly is at the end of April in Long Beach, CA. GA will be in Spokane, Wash 19-23 of June.

Accountability- Rev. Rachel will upload the minister's report and serve on minutes approval; Keith will work with focus groups, do a presentation on the budget for the meeting on April 14; obtain delegate counts for GA and DA, and bug the nominations committee. Mary Jane- will get the list of long time members and the list of things accomplished on long term plan. Kathy- will write the treasurers report by Thursday before the board meeting, and close out last year's church year. Lisawill make food panty signs; get tiles and supplies for April 28. Bruce will ask Coleen to ask Mark about a history lecture fundraiser; serve on approval of minutes committee, and do a focus group analysis; Gail will complete minutes, and contact the members who have worked with SURJ..

Themes:
Humor & Transformation

Smiles, giggles and hilarity reigned throughout the evening beginning with responses to stories "from the 'liberry'(library)" by the session leader. The antics of two inebriated library patrons began the session but a librarian's response when encountering a flasher, "May I help you?", elicited raucous laughter.

Others contributed pithy one liners and one person experienced being the brunt of laughs when substitute teaching, entering a classroom and stepping in the trash can. Performances of humorous scenes in a play can bring surprising results as reported by one participant. Audiences laugh in the wrong places or not at all. Scenes which seemed extremely funny to the players may be met with entirely different results. Everyone agreed that humor is a necessary ingredient in life, sometimes regenerating our energy and positive activity. One teller faced today's rigorous process of securing a passport with humor. For her, maintaining duel citizenships made negotiations more complex. Imagine having an application returned stating, "Your eyes can't be closed" when the picture clearly shows eyes open. Finally, the group was informed about a "laughing meditation" at UUCLV. The meditation leader simply went to the podium and began laughing. In minutes the whole congregation was laughing.

Although *Transformation* was a more serious theme, one person revealed that, after viewing a picture of aging with scowls and developing lines of depression, she concentrated on humor and "accentuating the positive." Her improved persona was evident in the lovely picture shared with the group. Transformation held a different meaning for the storyteller who once owned a vintage clothing store. Bulky sweaters, sought out and restored at his business were purchased and worn by a celebrity using the sweaters as his "transformative" calling card.

General Assembly is the annual meeting of our Unitarian Universalist Association. Attendees worship, witness, learn, connect, and make policy for the Association through democratic process. Anyone may attend; congregations must certify annually to send voting delegates. The 2019 General Assembly will be June 19-23 in Spokane, Washington. The Spokane region is the gateway for adventure and exploration in the Intermountain Northwest. Located driving distance from Glacier National Park and Yellowstone, Spokane is nestled in natural beauty.

Spokane is located on interstate I-90, 110 miles from the Canadian border and 18 miles from Idaho. It is the largest city between Seattle and Minneapolis.

Spokane International Airport (GEG) is serviced by Alaska, American, Delta, Frontier, Southwest, and United Airlines. Nonstop service is offered to 17 destinations, including Minneapolis, Chicago, Dallas, Phoenix, and LAX.

Spokane is accessible by rail via Amtrak's Empire Builder route (Chicago - St. Paul/Minneapolis - Spokane - Portland/Seattle). It is also reachable by Greyhound Bus.

GA will offer more than 100 programming selections over the course of five days. This year, in addition to Theme-Based Programming, the schedule will feature Role-Based Track Programming, including time for discussion among attendees, sharing inspiring models and stories, and concrete suggestions for how to further the work or "take it home." 
### **Financial Aid Available**

In the early 1900s, teenaged Sunja, the adored daughter of a crippled fisherman, falls for a wealthy stranger at the seashore near her home in Korea. He promises her the world, but when she discovers she is pregnant—and that her lover is married—she refuses to be bought. Instead, she accepts an offer of marriage from a gentle, sickly minister passing through on his way to Japan. But her decision to abandon her home, and to reject her son's powerful father, sets off a dramatic saga that will echo down through the generations.

Richly told and profoundly moving, *Pachinko* is a story of love, sacrifice, ambition, and loyalty. From bustling street markets to the halls of Japan's finest universities to the pachinko parlors of the criminal underworld, Lee's complex and passionate characters--strong, stubborn women, devoted sisters and sons, fathers shaken by moral crisis--survive and thrive against the indifferent arc of history.

Pachinko is the second novel by Korean-American author Min Jin Lee. Pachinko was a 2017 finalist for the National Book Award for fiction. Apple TV's streaming service has purchased the rights for a television adaptation of the novel. (Book review excerpted from Goodreads.com and Wikipedia.)




Common Good

Postcard campaign to our Legislators update: two of the three Bills we were endorsing have passed out of their Committees. The \$40 million in tax credits for homebuilders to increase the affordable housing stock, and the Bill for a Pay Day Lending web site to prevent consumers from over-borrowing have both been amended. At last check, the amendments do not change the essence or purpose of the Bills. We will provide more information as we get it. Thank you for your support!
