Introduction to the theme of the month by Kirk Loadman-Copeland:

Transendence

In everyday language, transcendence has the sense of "going beyond," while self-transcendence means going beyond a prior form or state of oneself. Mystical experiences represent a heightened reality in which the sense of a separate self is abandoned.

In philosophy, Rationalism was a school of philosophy that concluded that we can gain knowledge of the world through thinking alone, without experiencing the world. By contrast, the school of Empiricism claimed that our knowledge of the world only comes from experience

As one writer notes, "Extreme rationalists suggested that we avoid emotions and focus on rational thinking, extreme empiricists claimed there was no objective rational truth at all and thus all is simply subjective experience."

Immanuel Kant synthesized these conflicting positions with the introduction of a philosophical system called transcendental idealism. In the opening words in The Critique of Pure Reason, Kant suggests that: "There can be no doubt that all our knowledge begins with experience. ...But though all our knowledge begins with experience it does not follow that it all arises out of experience."

While we depend on experience to know anything at all, we are also able to reason and reach logical conclusions that aren't necessarily dependent upon a correlating experience. Such knowledge is a priori; that which we know regardless of sense-experience. For Kant, the "transcendent," as opposed to the "transcendental," is that which lies beyond what our faculty of knowledge can legitimately know. With others, Kant concluded that it was impossible to achieve any knowledge of the reality we call God, thus we could neither prove nor disprove God's existence.

In theology, the concept of transcendence is related to the idea of God being wholly other and existing beyond the world. Our first Unitarian Universalist source does not use the word "God" as the object of transcendence. Instead, it refers to the "Direct experience of that transcending mystery and wonder, affirmed in all cultures, which moves us to a renewal of the spirit and an openness to the forces which create and uphold life." As with Kant, this source is agnostic, while pointing to mystery itself.

Paul Tillich, a German American theologian, immigrated to America in 1933 and taught at Union Theological seminary, Harvard Divinity School, and the University of Chicago's Divinity School. He came to believe that the word "God" as a symbol pointing to a transcendent reality had ceased to be meaningful or useful. He even said, "The God of theism is dead." In place of the word God, Tillich spoke of both the Ground of Being (Where do you stand and why? What are your roots? What values connect you with the depths of life? What anchors you?) and Ultimate Concern (What transcends you? What commands your loyalty? What do you live for? What would you die for?). Assuming a vertical dimension between these two, you can construct your own theology.

Pantheism imagines that God interpenetrates every aspect of nature and extends timelessly beyond the universe, while pantheism holds that the divine is not a distinct being but is synonymous with the universe itself. Moving along this continuum, we arrive at religious naturalism, which views elements in nature as sacred, but does not find God a useful construct.

Many Voices Meeting May 2019

Themes:
Trains & Hope

WHOO-E-E-E, the whistle sounded, and off storytellers traveled with tales about trains. Beginning with the story leader of the month, almost everyone had tales about train travel to share. The lead narrative was that of young woman who, in 1907, met the conductor when traveling alone by train from Davenport, lowa to the Seattle World Fair. On another trip, sometime later, the young woman met the same train conductor and eventually married him - the storyteller's great grandfather. We were then taken on a historical trek to Washington when the state was still a territory. The most popular train ran from Olympia to Port Townsend. When the train was discontinued, the thriving Port died and never recovered. The same teller had pleasant memories of day trips by train with her grandmother, and a trip to Tasmania on a very old, rickety, mail train. This vehicle traveled very slowly as people sent and received mail through the windows. On still another trip from New Jersey to Niagara with her father, this same person was humiliated when having to return a stolen viewfinder. Another traveler, while studying in New York, took the train from a New Jersey suburb. On one occasion she was given a wrong ticket for the return trip home. When the mistake was discovered, as she was the last passenger late at night, her fears did not materialize - she was <u>not</u> kicked off the train.

Any saga about trains includes dangers faced by children. As a child, one person with her friend placed coins directly on the metal tracks, retrieving them later flattened and miss shaped. When diesel trains began arriving in stations much faster, she and her friends abandoned the practice.

Other colorful encounters with and on trains included: being on the train with members of a symphony orchestra who played during the trip; being "bumped" from a sleeper and having money returned for cost of the entire trip; traveling on a troop train during the Korean War years; and a trip with prisoners being taken to Sing, Sing. Only one person present had never traveled by train. Her experience with trains was in museums and viewing set-ups of toy trains.

The evening's storytelling adventure ended on the second theme with no responders. Most agreed that "Hope" was much too "passive" and "intangible" to engender many stories.

The Spokane region is the gateway for adventure and exploration in the Intermountain Northwest. Located driving distance from Glacier National Park and Yellowstone, Spokane is nestled in natural beauty.

Spokane is located on interstate I-90, 110 miles from the Canadian border and 18 miles from Idaho. It is the largest city between Seattle and Minneapolis.

Spokane International Airport (GEG) is serviced by Alaska, American, Delta, Frontier, Southwest, and United Airlines. Nonstop service is offered to 17 destinations, including Minneapolis, Chicago, Dallas, Phoenix, and LAX.

Spokane is accessible by rail via Amtrak's Empire Builder route (Chicago - St. Paul/Minneapolis - Spokane - Portland/Seattle). It is also reachable by Greyhound Bus.


