





An Introduction to the Monthly Theme: Worth and Dignity

The Reality Wall by Michelle Richards

We teach our children from an early age about the inherent worth and dignity of every person; they learn that it is important to seek justice, equity, and compassion; we emphasize a responsible search for truth and meaning and the goal of world community with peace, liberty, and justice for all. Then they hit a brick wall. Sometimes it's middle school, sometimes it comes earlier or later in life. But come it does: the realization that we are different from a large part of the world.

Lifelong UU Kate Erslev describes in her book, *Full Circle: Fifteen Ways to Grow Lifelong UUs*, how Howard Welsh, a Vietnam veteran raised as a Unitarian Universalist, felt his church had let him down by focusing only on its ideals. Welsh stressed to Erslev the importance of helping children and teens face the walls in our society. When their idealism comes face-to-face with the realities of injustice, intolerance, and judgment by their peers, will they be prepared? Or will they feel betrayed when they come up against our sexist, racist, oppressive, violent culture?

Although she is getting ready to graduate from high school now, I vividly remember the struggle my daughter Shannon faced in seventh and eighth grade when her school friends made it their mission to "convert" her to Christianity. Her church had taught her since she was a preschooler the importance of respecting the beliefs of others, and she just couldn't understand why her friends didn't follow the same code of morality that she did. It was only after multiple conversations between us, accompanied by lots of hugs and moral support from her church, that she was finally able to understand that her friends actually believed that they were helping her by trying to get her to accept Jesus as her Lord and Savior.

They've since parted ways, and Shannon has found a group of high school friends who love her and accept her for who she is. She is now out in her high school as bisexual and an atheist (which was actually harder for many people at her school to accept than the idea that she wasn't "straight"). She has also had the support of two different church communities, a Unitarian Universalist youth group and lifelong friends she bonded with at a camp for UU teens.

Did I as a parent let her down by not preparing her for this life lesson? At the time I feared that I did. But parents cannot anticipate every challenge our children will face, nor can we cushion them from all the difficulties they will experience in their lifetime. I did try to explain to her that other people in the world thought differently than we did, but it was mainly in the context of bullying and standing up for others. Instead, it was her friends who demeaned her by trying to convince her she was wrong, not her adversaries.

We cannot possibly protect our children against all the evil and pain in the world, and we shouldn't even try. But we do need to provide a safety net for them when they fall and give them a sledgehammer of Unitarian Universalist faith for when they come up against that wall.

Stewardship Notes

As we transition from our current minister to our next minister, I thought it would be a good exercise to write to you about what a minister does for our congregation. This way we are all informed about their duties and tasks and will find value as we head to another pledge year. In this space, I will be writing using the days of the week as a parable for the various tasks that they do throughout the year. Your Fundraising committee will edit these paragraphs, Rev. Rachel will be providing her input through personal interviews and solicitations of her colleagues and I will be doing some research to bring this all together into a rewarding experience. These writings will culminate in April just in time for our pledge drive. We will start with Monday, the day designated as the Sabbath for our minister.

For a minister, it may start right after the service, as they rest and decompress from a morning full of emotional energy and activities. It takes great interpersonal strength to lead and execute the service and is the climatic act of the week. It requires a time of decompression, away from the church, as they begin to focus on self-care and other family activities. This would include the mundane such shopping for groceries and spending quality time with their family. Being a minister involves being called upon in emergencies or when something devastating happens to a member. Since Monday is a day set aside for self-care and rejuvenation, the minister must have other people willing to handle any issues which can wait until Tuesday. If it so happens that something cannot wait, the minister then tries to "reimburse" their self-for time used on a different day. It is important to not let these "reimbursements" stack up or they inevitably short-change the minister.

It's a Dual Act!

The Board has two priorities for this year: Searching for a New Minister and Fundraising! As you might imagine, we need to be in good financial shape to attract a fabulous minister.

As a new board member, my responsibility is being the liaison for our Special Committees (Food Pantry, Bookies, Many Voices, Humanists, etc.). I'm also the liaison for our new Fundraising Committee. The three members heading that committee are Karin Metcalf, Mark Bergtholdt, and Kem Tetlow. Reverend Rachel and I attended their first meeting. Currently, two fundraising projects are being considered (in addition to an awesome Pledge Campaign). The committee is evaluating the possibility of hosting a weeklong "Winter Escape" in 2021 for UUs from across the continent. One of the attractions of this fundraising idea is that we'd be raising funds from outside our community. A very rough projection is that this program would net \$20,000. This project would need the same level of commitment and enthusiasm as we currently see with our Food Pantry. The following individuals are researching various preliminary pieces of this project:

The committee is also evaluating a short-term fundraising idea. UUA and Beacon Press have a program for selling UU-recommended books. Mark is gathering more information for the committee's consideration.
